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PARAMARSH REPORT

Auxilium College (Autonomous), Vellore September 2019 to February 2020

The IQAC team in consultation with the Accreditation Ambassador, Dr. Joe Jesudurai Former Head and Associate Professor, Department of Physics, Loyola College (Autonomous) Chennai-34 registered the institution under the PARAMARSH scheme of UGC on 19.08.2019. The proposal document which included the plan document, budget and the willingness letter from the Mentee Colleges were uploaded according to the format on 20.08.2019. The hard copy of the same was sent on 21.08.2019.

The approval of the institution for the PARAMARSH scheme was confirmed by UGC on 11.09.2019. In accordance with the communication for approval, action was taken in preparing the necessary documents for signing of the MoU by Auxilium College (Autonomous), Vellore with six Mentee Colleges. The PARAMARSH team of Auxilium College (Autonomous), Vellore visited the Mentee Colleges for the signing of the MoU on 13.09.2019.





A separate savings bank account was opened on 18.09.2019 in Indian Overseas Bank, Auxilium College Branch, Vellore for the scheme. All the documents were scanned and e-mailed on 19.09.2019 and the hard copy of the same was sent to UGC by speed post on the same day.

To obtain information on the current status of the Mentee Colleges in relation to the key indicators of NAAC, a brief questionnaire was prepared by the PARAMARSH team and the same was communicated to the IQAC coordinators of all the six Mentee Colleges (Annexure I). The Mentee Colleges were asked to furnish required data and submit the same to the PARAMARSH team. A copy of the filled in questionnaire from the six Mentee Colleges is enclosed in annexure II - VII.

Areas of concern based on the Questionnaire sent to the Mentee Colleges are:

- Lack of systematic and structured documentation in all except two institutions. The team gave the Mentee Colleges a sample template for creation and maintenance of records.
- Lack of Research in six Mentee Colleges. The team advised the Mentee Colleges to
 concentrate on locally and socially relevant research to begin with. It was decided
 workshops would be conducted for all the Colleges on, identifying locally relevant
 research areas, preparing and submitting project proposals to the appropriate agencies for
 funding and publications.
- Being located in remote / rural / tribal areas, retention of qualified staff is an area of major concern in all the Colleges.
- All the Mentee Colleges have feedback mechanisms in a systematized way, but it has to be documented and used for quality enhancement more effectively.
- Lack of MoUs was also a major concern of all the institutions. They were asked to work on MoUs with local and nearby institutions / organizations where their students were engaged in project work / internship / employed.
- The institutions were asked to apply for 2f, 12b and AISHE code at the earliest. Some institutions already have them.
- It was also decided to conduct AAA for all the Mentee Colleges at the earliest.

VISIT TO THE Mentee Colleges

A visit to the Mentee Colleges by the PARAMARSH team of Auxilium College (Autonomous), Vellore, was scheduled with the following as aim:

 To introduce and familiarize the IQAC Coordinator / IQAC members and the Accreditation Ambassador of Auxilium College (Autonomous), Vellore, the Mentor College under the PARAMARSH scheme of UGC, with the Management and IQAC core team of the six Mentee Colleges.

- To discuss with the Management and the IQAC team and staff members of the Mentee Colleges about their preparedness for NAAC.
- To get concrete suggestions on the specific needs of each College in specified areas and help them to move towards Accreditation.
- To plan specific programs based on individual Mentee College requirements.
- To share information regarding the common programs planned under the PARAMARSH scheme and to get suggestions from the Mentee Colleges.
- To discuss the timeline of the activities / programs to be conducted under the PARAMASH Scheme of UGC.

After consultation with the Mentee Colleges, depending on their convenience, the schedule for the visits by members of the PARAMARSH team was finalized. Since the Mentee Colleges are spread across Tamil Nadu, it was decided the visits would be executed in two phases.

SESSION I

Resource Person: Dr Srikanth, Dean-Academics, DG Vaishnav College, Chennai.

As part of the teaching and learning process the following were suggested:

- More activities (such as role play and case study) apart from chalk and talk.
- To have a You-Tube channel for the College, where videos can be uploaded after validation. Mentor could be allotted for students until he/she completes her UG/PG program with an average ratio of Mentor-Mentee could be 1:15.
- Evidences for every meeting held should be maintained.
- Evidences must also be maintained for every activity conducted or the ICT tools used.

- Slow learners could be supported by Peer learning, English language learning, bridge courses, e-content etc.
- Advanced learners could be supported by way of internships, research lab, research publication, coaching for CAT, MAT exams, enroll in MOOC courses etc.
- Every activity conducted for slow learners and advanced learners should be enclosed with the appropriate report that includes the attendance sheet, module covered, test marks etc.
- Engage the alumni in addressing the first year students during the orientation programme conducted at the beginning of every academic year.
- Alumni could also be engaged in conducting mock interviews and helping build the resumes for final year students.
- Calculate the attainment of PO and COs the same for CIEs conducted at the College.

In the second session on Outcome-based education, Dr Srikanth insisted that the PEOs defined have to be aligned with the Vision and mission of the College. To ensure that the course outcomes are achieved, the staff must execute the course with proper planning. He suggested that the plan prepared at the beginning of the semester should have the planned date, which must not be accessible for modification later. The staff must be able to enter only the actual date of completion. He shared samples of PEOs aligned with the mission and vision of the College.

Regarding Student Satisfaction Survey Dr. Scholastica added that the students must be aware of the survey and hence handed a few brochures to be pasted on the walls of classrooms.





All the above programmes targeted the Mentee Colleges. There was very good participation and all the doubts were clarified.


