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Preface

Auxilium College is one of the oldest institutions established in 1954 in an arid semi-

rural place - Katpadi, near Vellore. It is the first women's college in Vellore District, with the

heritage of offering higher education to the rural young women of, Vellore and all the






UBA Activity of the year- 2021

Demographic Details and Analysis of the Adopted Village

Vellore is one of the biggest districts in Tamil Nadu. The district is primarily agrarian with majority of its population involved in agriculture. Leather based industry (tanning, garment manufacturing, foot wear manufacturing industries) is the main industrial sector in this district. Vellore district has an area of 6077 km. Vellore district lies between 12°15' to 13°15' North latitudes and 78°20' to 79°50' East longitudes in Tamil Nadu State. The 5 (K.V.Kuppam, P.K.Puram, Pillanthepet, Pasumathur and Mudinampet) adopted villages in K.V.Kuppam Block- situated in Vellore district of Tamil Nadu, India. Lack of irrigation water facilities and support services in water management have made farming operation in this district an exercise in futility.

All the hamlets in the K.V.Kuppam Block- have been considered as drought prone areas as the rainfall was only an average of 800 mm per year. Even this little quantity was not properly collected, conserved and utilised. As the agricultural methods changed and extraction of underground water became common practice, the general water table level went down alarmingly, causing the existing open wells to dry up even before the onset of summer.

The population survive with poor economic status and mainly dependent on rain fed farming and livestock rearing-goat. As the area receives poor and scanty rainfall the farming communities could not depend on agriculture operation for their survival. Even rain fed farming also fails due to lack of rainfall during the north east monsoon. Landless communities which are depending on farming often suffer due to lack of work and migrate to other towns, cities or states in search of work.

Socio-economic Status

Prevailing and increasing land degradation and loss of productivity due to manmade and natural causes have serious implications on the livelihood of the marginalized residing in the adopted villages in K.V.Kuppam Block, Vellore District. Most of the women are workless, for very occasionally they are engaged with certain farming works. Moreover the income is at erratic to every household .With regard to housing the target community lives in hut houses without adequate space and sanitation. Poor sanitation and open defecation also negatively impacts the lives of focal communities particularly the women and children by crippling development. The health and hygiene situation also worsened due to the

overall poverty and penury, and the villagers are easy preys to the heartless usurers. Due to the poor status of livelihood many families in the communities are unable to send their children for higher education. Girl children are the worst victims of this situation and often discontinued from schooling which creates gender inequity.














From the above table we can see that there is no government schemes and coverage seen in the villages or the majority of the respondents don't have the awareness of different schemes available for them
