In the evening the Residential Students of all the hostels welcomed her with a beautiful song and presented their life in the hostel, by expressing spontaneously about the integral formation they receive in various ways at different levels in the Salesian atmosphere. Autonomy Review

The Members of the Autonomy Commission visited the college in February 2015. The Chairman of the committee, Dr. (Mrs). Manimekalai and the committee members had presented a review for which the UGC has approved Extension of Autonomy Status from the academic year 2015-16 to the academic year 2020-21.

India – Sri Lanka Youth Exchange Programme

In the History of Auxilium the first International visit, India – Srilanka Youth Exchange Program, was organized joining hands with the Audacious Dreams Foundation from 5th July to 12th July 2015. Mr. Dinesh Gajendran, Dr. Beulah Suresh and Dr. Sheila Susairaj were the coordinators for the Indian team which consisted of twenty students from various departments of the college. The team visited Srilanka National Parliament, University of Ruhuna, High Commission of India in Srilanka and Srilanka Ministry of Youth Affairs. The youth of both countries actively participated in the India –Srilanka Youth Dialogue, in which ideas were exchanged about politics, art, culture, trade, sports and education. As an extension activity, they volunteered in painting the furniture of Buwanekaba Government school at Maharagama.

The Srilankan Team comprising of fifteen students and three coordinators visited India from 13th August to 19th August 2015. Their stay at India was hosted by Auxilium College. They visited all Historical places in Chennai, Queensland, Brahamakumari Meditation Centre, Rajiv Gandhi Memorial, Vellore Fort, Golden Temple and Hokkenekel. They also visited Institutions like IVDP Krishnagiri, Academy of Prisons and Correctional Administration and VIT University. The Srilankan Youth met Deputy High Commissioner of Srilanka, His Excellency, M.K. Patmanathan. The India-Srilanka-UK Youth dialogue was held in Auxilium College, where representatives from all the three countries participated.

Challenge India-International Special Project Annual Award Ceremony was conducted in Auxilium College, on 11th February 2016. Mr. Kapil Bhalla, National Director, National Award Authority, New Delhi and Mr. Bhivujith Mukhoty, Programme Manager, were the guests for the Annual Award Ceremony of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award. 200 students from various schools and colleges from Tamil Nadu received their Bronze award for their skills, service and physical activity in which 150 students were from Auxilium college.

Adventurous Trip to Yelagiri

A two-day camp at Don Bosco Retreat Centre, Yelagiri was organized for MBA, BBA and B.Com students. The trip included trekking, camp fire and cultural events. Soft skill training was given to the students through sports by Big Bus, Bangalore.

Sanctioned Project

The United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia has approved a small grant project for US \$ 5,000 to Auxilium College for the academic year 2015-2016 with Dr. Beulah Suresh as the Principal Investigator for the project.

Distinguished Award

Neela Nageshwari, II-M.Sc Mathematics won the first place in the district level 'Poet Bharathidasan Poem Reciting Competition' conducted by the DMK party on 25th July 2015 and received a cash prize of 5000/- from the honourable former minister Mr. Durai Murugan.

Flood Relief Fund

For the recent flood that devastated parts of Tamil Nadu, staff and students of Auxilium college came forward to contribute generously. Rs. 4, 79,462/- was generated from the college, and staff and student volunteers personally involved themselves in distributing essential requisites to the victims.

Educative Plan

In view of promoting academic performance, the educative plan for the year devised an assessment scheme that could revise study patterns and academically

engage students all the year round. Two Unit Tests were administered periodically in each Semester, besides the regular Continuous Assessment Examinations, enabling students to perform better and seek good results.

Resorting to books for references and information has remained the best method for learning despite recent trends and technology. Keeping this in view, the college has initiated the construction of a spacious library with advance techniques for easy access to inculcate reading habit in students.

Fitness and stamina of the students have always been matters of primary concern to which the construction of a new Gymnasium and Women's Hostel, partially funded by the UGC are taking shape.

The Faculty

The dedication, expertise and commitment of the faculty members have made Auxilium excel in all spheres and reach its goals. The eagerness and earnestness to equip themselves with the latest trends in their own disciplines reflects in their involvement in participating and presenting papers in National and International forums. The college is proud to place on record Ms. Isabella, Dept. of Botany, Ms. Kasthuri, Dept. of Mathematics, Ms. Meenakshi, Dept. of Commerce, Ms. Senthilselvi, Dept. of Tamil and Ms. Srilatha, Dept. of Commerce are proud recipients of Doctoral Degrees and Ms. Abi Beulah, Dept. of Biochemistry, Ms. Auxilia Antony, Dept. of Commerce, Ms. Kalaiselvi and Ms. Latha, Dept. of English are awaiting their thesis defense. The management would like to appreciate the efforts taken up by faculty members in enhancing the quality of research. 25 papers from the Department of Tamil, 16 papers from Mathematics, 14 from English, 12 from Computer Science, 5 from Commerce, 3 from Business Administration, 2 from Microbiology and 1 from Chemistry have been peer reviewed and published National and International Journals.

Formative Programs

Upgrading, encouraging and motivating staff to adopt current trends besides nurturing healthy relationship with students has ever been in prime focus in Auxilium. To serve this interest, various formative programs were organized. A two-day staff orientation program was organized on the 16th and 17th of June 2015, with Fr. Gnyanadas edifying faculty on educational psychology and Fr. Arokiya Doss illuminating on the preventive system of education. A Faculty development programme on "Promoting Youth Volunteerism and Skill Development through Global recognition" was organized on 10th February 2016. 75 participants from colleges and schools in Tamil Nadu attended the programme.

A student orientation program was held on the 18th of June highlighting self-esteem, time-management, goal-setting and smart analysis animated by Fr. Kamalesh, Fr. Leo, Mr. Prem and Mr. Simon. Students were enlightened on the aspect of self-introspection for holistic personality development.

Certificate Courses

The college offers the following inter-disciplinary and career-oriented UGC funded certificate courses.

The Human Resource Management & Development Certificate Course offered by the Department of Commerce, navigated under the able guidance of Dr. Sr. Sheila Susairaj is a bi-semester program working on Industrial visits for field experience to Soorai Green Limited, Sholinghur and Roca Parryware Ltd., Ranipet, aiding exposure to enhance upward mobility for job seeking youngsters from different courses in the college.

The Human Rights and Values in Education Certificate Course offered by the Department of Sociology, with the expertise of Mrs. Fancy Thomas, Head, Department of Sociology undertook field visits to social welfare centers like Women's Remand Home, Home for the Aged and Anbullam.

The Department of English offers a **Certificate Course in Communication Skills** open to UG second-year students of the college, working on promoting communicative skills, under the guidance of Dr. Venum Cecilia, Head, Dept. of English. The course design focuses on improving productive skills besides developing listening and reading competencies.

The Department of Zoology directed by Dr. Sr. Regina Mary, Asst. Prof. Department of Zoology, offers a **Certificate Course in Medical Laboratory Technique**. The students of MLT visited CMC and VIT University and were updated with modern techniques in the medical laboratory.

The Rural Handicraft Certificate Course offered by the Department of Tamil coaches students interested in learning stitching, sewing, embroidering, sponge-doll making, ornamental accessories for women and other attractive handicraft products.

The **Certificate Course** offered by the Department of Computer Science trains all third year UG students in MS-Office, MS Word, MS-Excel and MS Power Point to enable students experience the benefits of using computers.

The **Software Certificate Course** organized by the Department of Visual Communication exercises students for a period of two weeks in April, opening registration for women in and around Auxilium premise.

Centre for ICWA, CA, RRB, LIC and CAT Coaching

The College is a recognized coaching center under the Institute of Cost Accountants. Dr. (Sr.) Sheila Susairaj, Asso. Prof. Dept. of Commerce coordinates the coaching classes for IAS, LIC, Railways, ICWAI, CAT, TIME Organization, P.O Banks, CA (Group I and II), IIBF and Ms. Auxilia Antony for TNPSC.

Centre for UGC-NET, UGC-CSIR NET and SET Coaching

The College is also a recognized center for coaching classes for UGC-NET, UGC-CSIR NET and SET Exams with Dr. Elsamma Cherian, Associate Professor, Dept. of Hindi as the coordinator. 160 students enrolled and benefitted by the classes in English, Commerce, Chemical Sciences and General Paper. NET and SET Paper I has also been included in the curriculum for PG students in the third Semester of the academic year. The credit of three candidates having cleared the NET exams testifies the benefit of the classes.

Sports and Games

Success is where preparation and opportunity meet. The Sports Department nurtures the spirit of sportsmanship and encourages active participation in the students. In the beginning of the academic year a fitness programme for 40 hours was conducted for all the first years. The Intramural tournaments were conducted for many events like Volley Ball, Basket Ball, Foot Ball, Hand Ball, Hockey, Cricket, Ball Badminton, Shuttle Badminton, Kho-Kho, etc...The Annual Sports Day was held on 19th September 2015. The march past shield was lifted by the department of B.Sc. Computer Science. At the Inter collegiate level, our college players were Winners in Hand Ball and Runners-up in Basket Ball, Hockey and Foot Ball. In the Interdivisional tournaments our team secured second place in Hockey, Foot Ball, Cricket, and third place in Volley Ball and Kho-Kho. Fifteen of our sports stars represented the Thiruvalluvar University and participated in the Inter University tournaments. In Riviera 2016, the International Sports and Cultural Events organized by VIT University, Vellore, our college Athletic Team won medals, certificates and received a cash prize of Rs. 10, 000/-. In the South Zone Inter University Foot Ball Tournament conducted at Chennai, Madras University, Anjeline Rita A – III B.A. English section ‘A’ was a member of the winning Foot Ball team. In the Chief Minister Trophy tournament conducted by SDAT we were Runners-up in Basket

Ball and received a cash award of Rs 6000/-. S Archana, III B.A. English received a cash award of RS 1000/- for long jump. At the University Level, Miss Vijayalakshmi (III B.Com) played T.T and Miss. Srimathi (III B.Sc Maths) was selected to play hand ball. S. Divya(III B.Sc Maths) participated in the 200 meters dash, 800 meters race, discus throw and high jump in VIT RIVERA and received a cash award of Rs.2500/-

Auxilium Research Cell

A video conference program on Climatic Change was conducted by the Auxilium Research Cell on 21st Aug 2015 chaired by the resource person Dr. Roger Dargaville, Deputy Director and Senior Analyst, Melbourne Energy Institute, Melbourne. An intercollegiate PG Paper presentation was conducted on 8th Oct 2015. A workshop on *Research Proposal Design* was organized for Staff members on 28th Oct 2015. Dr. Jayakumar Asso. Prof. Dept. of Environmental Science, GITAM University, Bangalore delivered a lecture on Disaster Management for the M. Phil students. On 12th Dec 2015 Sr. Isabella oriented students on ‘What is Human Rights?.

IQAC- The Internal Quality Assurance Cell

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell prepared the AQAR for the year 2014-15, which was duly submitted to NAAC this year. The ASQC Self-Study Report has also been submitted. The IQAC team members and the college is eagerly awaiting the NAAC visit for the third cycle of Reaccreditation.

Association Activities

The **English Association** was inaugurated by Ms. V.P. Gayathri, Head, Department of English, DKM College, Vellore. The Department of English celebrated the 150th year of publication of the Lewis Carroll’s, *Alice in Wonderland*, which also formed the basis for Interdepartmental Dramatics. Interesting episodes from the novel were enacted by our students and were judged by Professor Allan John, Ms. Ruby Martin (College Counsellor) and Dr. Anitha (Thiruvalluvar U). Sr. Celine D’Souza Memorial Lecture chaired by Professor David Arpudharaj, Bharathiyar University, was designed on using dreams as a language tool for creative writing. An essay writing competition based on Pope’s peace message was conducted in January 2016, entitled ‘Peace is both a Gift of God and a Human

Achievement'. Journalism Club and Theatre Club were also inaugurated simultaneously.

Ma Vedanayagar Pillai **Tamil Association** was inaugurated in July by Ma Narayanan, waving the green flag with a speech on the empowerment of women. Dr. Chandy acknowledged the details and particulars mentioned in the Annual Report which reflects and envelopes the hard work of the entire academic year and appreciated the massive and mammoth task of running a college of this magnitude. He referred to Vellore as a very special place, not only for its historical

significance, but also for the convergence of many educational institutions- housing the world's best medical college, one of the world's best private engineering colleges, one of India's oldest colleges of education in Voorhees College and the first women's college in Auxilium way back in 1954. He felt it a great privilege to be part of this chain and also reminded the students that they were a part of the history of Auxilium College having been trained and taught to take their lives into the next phase from the launching pad of Auxilium College. Looking into the significance of the day, celebrating the excellence of three people-Mrs. Fancy Thomas, one of the teaching faculty of Auxilium College, Ms. Thangaprakash, honored by the President of India for her teaching excellence and Mr. P. V.V. Moorthy, being a very prominent individual and a citizen of Vellore, he spoke of three features which have made them excel in their respective fields.

He spoke of motivation as being the root of all success before talent, the third feature being opportunity. Talent doesn't surface without motivation and opportunity follows talent. Opportunities are provided by parents and teachers and it is for the students to motivate themselves to become talented. His message for the day was that the first step to success is to come center stage and get motivated, which will lead to acquisition of talent irrespective of the field. He referred to the lives of Dr. A. P. J. Abdul Kalam, Mahatma Gandhi and Mother Teresa who were all motivated in life to serve the country and the poor. They created opportunities for themselves with tremendous effort despite various hurdles.

With the combination of these three features, he said, the college is bound to honor many more distinguished personalities like Mrs. Fancy Thomas, Ms. Thangaprakash and Mr. P. V.V. Moorthy in the years to come.

He concluded his speech by proclaiming a simple truth in the form of a message.

“When others sit, you must stand;
When others just stand, you must stand in;
When others just stand in, you must stand up;
When others stand up, you must stand out;
When others stand out, you must be outstanding, and
When you become outstanding, you will get a standing ovation.”

GRADUATION DAY ADDRESS

The Graduation Day, presided by Dr. K. Murugan, Vice- Chancellor, Thiruvalluvar University, was a memorable event with an inspiring and motivating speech addressed to the young aspirants waiting to receive their degrees. The Chief Guest began with a note of appreciation, congratulating the youngsters for their achievement on the eve of the 56th Graduation Day of the great Auxilium College. He expressed his happiness in sharing a few aspects of the college and also his joy over their successful completion of their respective courses.

Dr. K. Murugan pointed out that India is not only known for its plant and animal diversity but also for its human diversity. Indians have proved their intelligence through their hard work and knowledge in the field of Information Technology which has been acknowledged and utilized by the Americans. He emphasized that whatever is learnt in the course of learning should not only be subject oriented but also community oriented. He suggested that the students make the best use of the opportunities and funds offered by the Ministry of Science and Technology through the College and to pursue further studies and research.

Auxilium College, being a very old institution which began in 1954 celebrating its 56th Graduation Day, caters to the educational requirements of the local people from neighboring towns and villages by providing good education. The College Report that was presented was found very impressive with details pertaining to academics, education, extra-curricular activities, the Indo-Sri Lankan program and the Indo- UK program. He appreciated the teachers' commitment and the responsibility shouldered by the Sisters in molding these young women both educationally and otherwise.

Since it's a women's college, he quoted Madam Curie, a woman scientist - a recipient of two Nobel Prizes, despite her poor background. He motivated the students that we Indians have all the required resources in India. We should know how to make use of these resources for medicine, industry and other fields. To validate the idea, he quoted neem as an example. Although its origin is in India, we haven't worked much on it. Scientists from abroad have studied the properties of the plant and patented it. Their work on the uses of neem seeds as an insecticide is extensive. Though our ancestors have long known its insecticidal property, its uses

as an anti-biotic, anti-septic and anti-viral, we have failed to work on it and patent it. India has many resources like neem that haven't been duly studied. Turmeric and basmati rice- two other resources were also referred to in the same context. He insisted that each youngster be aware of the resources available in India.

He identified plastics to be one of major problems today. Strewn plastics do not allow sewers to drain properly leading to contamination of water which promotes breeding of mosquitoes. Youngsters should think of working on preventing environmental contamination. Climate change is another global problem. Global warming is alarming the natural eco-system, forest system and oceanic system.

So he insisted we should be aware of the happenings around us. And we as Indians should contribute the fruits of our knowledge to the development of our country. At this juncture, he congratulated all the graduates who were eagerly waiting to receive their degrees.

EMPOWERMENT

Education is lifelong learning. Empowerment is the training for citizenship, instilling confidence in the students to act effectively on decisions over which they can exercise self control. The training for good citizenship begins in the cradle and continues through life time. To grow effectively in social consciousness the students need to feel they have ownership in educational process and the power to effect change. Empowered teachers are in the best position to empower students because they effect change, not only in their class rooms but in the society. Empowerment is the process by which people gain control over their lives..... participation with others to achieve goals, an effort to gain access to resources and understanding of the environment. Desiring for power and declaring self governance does not make an empowered teacher. Empowerment includes a sense of having the motivation to perform better. Teachers can play an important role in building self esteem and create an environment in which students exercise principles of empowerment. But the teachers must feel empowered before they have confidence to give up the need to control all aspects of learning, students can try and succeed. As students they move towards accepting responsibility for their own learning they thus become more empowered.

Empowered teachers

Some teachers are more inclined to feel empowered than others. Those who work in an environment predisposed to empowering members of the community naturally feel more empowered. Some of the qualities of the empowering environment are:

1. Clarity of role and expectations

2. Social emotional peer support
3. Access to resources such as space materials, time and funds.
4. Inspired leadership that shares vision and values.

Teachers who dedicate actively advocating for other teachers and students can maintain a positive attitude in the face of stress and discouragement. Empowered teachers can foster student empowerment in several ways. Allowing the students to follow original ideas and solve complex problems make them committed to their own learning. Becoming an empowered teacher is not without internal conflict. Empowerment has its responsibilities as well as its advantages; however empowered teachers increase their ability to effect change for students. The best way to empower students in “owning” their own learning is to first empower teachers and spark within the teacher the desire to share power.

Students can be empowered through recognition of student initiative as well as success. And this takes the emphasis off the risk of trying new ideas of community building within the class room and college and lets the students establish their own identity with their school and classmates. Team work can develop strong relationships, that foster peer support. Simply listening to students verbal and non verbal messages with an open mind can reinforce for the student the worth of her ideas. When students are allowed to make meaningful contributions in their college and community, they learn confidence and responsibility. As teachers model the importance of self-reliance students become more empowered. Encouraging and equipping the students with necessary skills lead to empowerment. Empowered students become empowered citizens.

- Networking is empowering. Teaching students how to net work to get their needs met is a powerful lesson on empowerment.
- Genuine empowerment is to make the students feel that they can make good decisions.
- When the student’s needs are met, they can focus on the greater aspects of learning.

Teachers have the opportunity to leave an indelible impression on their students' lives. There is potential in every student, and a teacher's empowerment attitude and actions can leave lasting impressions. Teachers need to be risk takers by being themselves and by trusting their students. They also need to create independent individuals so learning is more likely to take place. Effective teachers genuinely care, like, accept and value and empower their students. These teachers will demonstrate kindness, share responsibility, accept diversity, foster individual education and encourage creativity.

Zika virus

Introduction:

Zika virus is an emerging mosquito-borne virus that was first identified in Uganda in 1947 in rhesus monkeys through a monitoring network of sylvatic yellow fever. It was subsequently identified in humans in 1952 in Uganda and the United Republic of Tanzania. Outbreaks of Zika virus disease have been recorded in Africa, the Americas, Asia, and the Pacific.

Genre: flavivirus

Vector: Aedes mosquitoes

(which usually bite during the morning
and late afternoon / evening hours)

Zika virus (ZIKV) is the member of the virus family flaviviridae and genus flavivirus transmitted by day-time-active aedes mosquitoes such as *A.aegypti* and *A.albopictus*.

Virus isolation in monkeys and mosquitoes, 1947:

The virus was first isolated in April 1947 from a rhesus macaque monkey that had been placed in a cage in the zika forest of Uganda, near lake Victoria, by the scientist of the yellow fever research institute. A second isolation from the mosquito *A. africanus* followed at the same site in January 1948. When the monkey developed fever, researchers isolated from its serum a transmissible agent that was first described as zika virus in 1952.

First evidence of human infection,1952:

Zika virus had been known to infect humans from the results of serological surveys in Uganda and Nigeria. A serosurvey of 84 people of all ages showed, 50 had antibodies, with all above 40 years of age being immune.

It was not until 1954 that the successful isolation of zika virus from a human was published. This came as a part of a 10 year old Nigerian female with low grade fever, headache and evidence of malaria but no jaundice, who recovered within 3 days. Blood was injected into the brain of laboratory mice, followed by upto 15 mice passages.

The virus from mouse brains was then tested in neutralization tests using rhesus monkey sera specifically immune to zika virus. In contrast, no virus was isolated from the blood of two infected adults with fever, jaundice, cough, diffuse joint pains in one and fever, headache, pain behind the eyes and in the joints.

Spreading equatorial Africa and to Asia:

From 1951 through 1981, evidence of human infection with zika virus was reported from other African countries such as the central African republic, Egypt,

Gabon, Sierra Leone, Tanzania, Uganda as well as in parts of Asia including India, Indonesia, the Philippines, Thailand and Vietnam. From its discovery until 2007, confirmed cases of zika virus infection from Africa and south east Asia were rare.

Micronesia, 2007:

In April 2007, the first outbreak outside of Africa and Asia occurred on the island of Yap in the Federated States of Micronesia, characterized by rash, conjunctivitis, and arthralgia, which was initially thought to be dengue, chikungunya or Ross river disease. Serum samples from patients in the acute phase of illness contained RNA of zika virus. There were 49 confirmed cases, 59 unconfirmed cases, no hospitalizations and no deaths. More recently, epidemics have occurred in Polynesia, Easter Island, the Cook Islands and New Caledonia.

Since April, 2015 a large, ongoing outbreak of zika virus that began in Brazil spread to much of South and Central America and the Caribbean. In January 2016 the CDC issued a level 2 travel alert for people travelling to region and certain countries where zika virus transmission is ongoing. The agencies also suggested that women thinking about becoming pregnant should consult with their physicians before travelling.

Governments or health agencies of the United Kingdom, Ireland, New Zealand, Canada and the European Union and others soon issued similar travel warnings. In Colombia, Minister of Health and Social Protection Alejandro Gaviria Uribe recommended to avoid pregnancy for 8 months, while the countries of Ecuador, El Salvador, Jamaica have issued similar warnings.

Plans were announced by the authorities in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, to try to prevent the spread of the zika virus during the 2016 summer Olympic games in that city. According to the CDC, Brazilian health authorities reported more than 3500 microcephaly cases between October 2015 and January 2016. Some of the affected infants have had several types of microcephaly and some have died. The full spectrum of outcomes that might be associated with infection during pregnancy and factors that might increase risk to the foetus are not yet fully understood. More studies are planned to learn more about the risks of zika virus infection during

pregnancy. In the worst affected region of Brazil, approximately 1% of new borns are suspected of being microcephalic.

Symptoms:

About one in five people infected with zika virus become ill. (i.e. develop zika)

The most common symptoms of zika are fever, rash, joint pain, or conjunctivities (red eyes). Other common symptoms include muscle pain and headache. The incubation period (the time from exposure to symptoms) for zika virus disease is not known, but is likely to be a few days to a week. The illness is usually mild with symptoms lasting for several days to a week. People usually don't get sick enough to go to the hospital, and they very rarely die of zika. Zika virus usually remains in the blood of the infected person for about a week but it can be found longer in some people.

Transmission:

Zika virus is transmitted to people through the bite of infected mosquitoes from the Aedes genus, mainly Aedes aegypti in tropical region.

Diagnosis:

Zika virus is diagnosed through PCR (polymerase chain reaction) and virus isolation from blood samples. Diagnosis by serology can be difficult as the virus can cross react with other flaviviruses such as dengue, west nile, and yellow fever.

Treatment:

There is no vaccine to prevent or specific medicine to treat zika infections.

Prevention:

“Prevention is better than cure”.

Mosquitoes and their breeding sites pose a significant risk factor for zika virus infection. Prevention and control relies on reducing mosquitoes through source reduction (removal and modifications of breeding sites) and reducing contact between mosquitoes and people. This can be done by using insect repellent; wearing clothes (preferably light coloured) that cover as much of the body as possible; using

physical barriers such as screens, closed doors, windows and sleeping under mosquito nets.

It is also important to empty, clean or cover containers that can hold water such as buckets, flower pots or tyres, so that places where mosquitoes can breed are removed. Special attention and help should be given to those who may not be able to protect themselves adequately, such as young children, the sick or elderly.

During outbreaks, health authorities may advise that spraying of insecticides be carried out. Insecticides recommended by the WHO pesticide evaluation scheme may also be used as larvicides recommended by the governments to treat relatively large water containers.

Zika virus-during pregnancy:

In 2015, zika virus RNA was detected in the amniotic fluid of two pregnant women whose foetuses had microcephaly, indicating that the virus had crossed the placenta and could have caused a mother-to-child infection.

According to the WHO on 5 February 2016, a Casual link between the zika virus and, microcephaly is “strongly suspected but not yet scientifically proven” and “although the microcephaly cases in brazil are spatio-temperally associated with the zika outbreak, more robust investigations and research is needed to better understand this potential link”.

On 5 February 2016, the united states DC updated its health care provider guidelines for pregnant women and women of reproductive age. The new recommendations include offering serologic testing to pregnant women without zika fever symptoms who have return home from areas with ongoing zika virus transmission in the last 2-12 weeks; and for pregnant women without zika symptoms living in such areas, they recommend testing at the beginning of prenatal care and follow-up testing in the 5th month of pregnancy.

Vaccine development:

Effective vaccines exist for several flaviviruses. Vaccines for yellow fever virus, Japanese encephalitis and tick-borne encephalitis were introduced in the

1930s, while the vaccine for dengue fever only became available for use in the mid-2010s.

Work has begun towards developing a vaccine for zika virus, according to Anthony fauci, director of the national institute of allergy and infectious diseases. The researches at the vaccine research centre have extensive experience from working with vaccines for other viruses such as west Nile virus, chikungunya virus, and dengue fever. Nikos Vasilakis of the centre for biodefense and emerging infectious disease predicted that it may take 2 years to develop a vaccine, but 10-12 years may be needed before an effective zika virus vaccine is approved by regulators for public use.

Indian company Bharat Biotech is working on two approaches to a vaccine: “recombinant” involving genetic engineering, and “inactivated”, where the virus is incapable of reproducing itself but can still trigger an immune response. On 3 February 2016, the company claimed animal trials of the inactivated version would commence in two weeks.

We should prepare recommendations for clinical care and follow-up of people with zika virus, in collaboration with experts and other health agencies. The best way of prevention is protection against mosquito bites.
