Exposure Visit of Delegates from Kerala

A Team of 14 delegates, comprising of Principals, Academicians, IQAC Coordinators and Teachers from the Mary Thomas Higher Education Commission, Kerala, headed by Dr.M.O.Koshy, Former Pro-Chancellor, Kannur University, visited Auxilium, on 27 November 2018, to be exposed to the policy, planning and execution of the activities, involving teaching, learning, evaluation and extension. The team had a meeting with the College Council, and sought clarifications on academics, extra-curricular, extension activities and the overall work-culture and best practices of Auxilium College.

RUSA

The institution applied for funding under component 8 (Research, Innovation & Quality Improvement) of Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) – Phase II, Department of Higher Education, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India and the college has been approved by the MHRD for the funding.

DST – FIST

The College has been sanctioned Rs. 50 Lakhs by DST-FIST funding for PG infrastructure developments.

The management had entered a Memorandum of Understanding on Academic and Research collaboration with Lincoln University College, Malaysia for offering better perspectives to students and faculty in the field of education.

Faculty Development PrograMs.

Upgrading, encouraging and motivating staff to adopt current trends besides nurturing healthy relationship with students has ever been the prime concern of the Auxilium Community. To serve this interest, various formative prograMs. were organized by the college and staffwere encouraged to participate in FDP programmes organised by other colleges and universities.

As part of Faculty Development Programme 65 staff inclusive of Day and Evening Shifts attended 34 FDP programmes in various states and local districts. Ms. Lalith Priya, Dept. of Commerce (Shift II) and Dr. Gayathri, Dept. of B.Com (B & I) attended a 7-day FDP programme organised by Asian University for Women, Chittagong, Bangladesh on Higher Education in Asia.

Certificate Course

The college offers the following inter-disciplinary and career-oriented UGC funded certificate courses like Human Resource Management, Communication Skills, Medical Laboratory Techniques, Rural Handicraft and MS.-Office to enable development of productive skills through exposure and experience.

Centre for ICWA, CA, RRB, LIC, CAT and TNPSC Coaching

The College is a recognized coaching centre under the Institute of Cost Accountants. Dr. (Sr.) Sheila Susairaj, Vice Principal (Shift II) coordinates the coaching classes for LIC, Railways, ICWAI, CAT, TIME Organization, P.O Banks and CA (Group I and II).Dr. (Ms.) Auxilia Antony coordinates TNPSC coaching classes. 166 students have registered their names for the classes. Ms. Thilagavathy, a student of B.Com., undertook TNPSC coaching classes was selected and appointed to the post of Junior Assistant Commercial Taxes, Vellore Division.

Centre for UGC-NET, UGC-CSIR NET and SET Coaching

The College is also a recognized centre for coaching classes for UGC-NET, UGC-CSIR NET and SET ExaMs. with Dr. Hilda Princi Annie, Assistant Professor, Dept. of English as the coordinator. 191 students enrolled and benefited by the classes in General Paper.

Sports and Games

Zest is the breath of Life. With the zestful spirit of sportsmanship, Auxilians took part in District, State, Thiruvalluvar University, Intercollegiate, Inter Divisional, South Zone Inter-University. All India Inter-University sports and tournaments. At the Intercollegiate level, students were winners in shuttle badminton and runners up in basket ball, volley ball, table tennis and foot ball. At the Inter Divisional Athletic Meet, students secured most of the prizes and won the Overall Athletic Championship Trophy and secured the first place in hockey, second place in foot ball, basket ball, shuttle badminton and volley ball. Ms. Vidya of III B.Sc. Physics was selected to participate in the All India Inter-University Football Tournament, Punjab. Our college's athletic team participated in PEGASIS – 18 organised by Christian Medical College winning most of the prizes and were honored with the Over-All Championship Trophy. The college shuttle badminton team participated in the Rajeswari Viswanathan Memorial Tournament organized by VIT University and Secured I Place. Our college's athletic team was awarded the Overall Championship cup in the events at Nethaji Stadium, Vellore. The team participated in the District Level Athletic Meet organized by District Athletic Association and secured most of the prizes. A special word of appreciation to Monica Florence S. II B.C.A. for securing 12 gold medals from various Athletic Meets, this year. The 63rd Sports day of Auxilium College was celebrated on 30 August 2018. The Guest of Honour was Mr. K.Adivera Pandiyan, Additional Deputy Superintendent of Police, Vellore District. The Dept. of Physical Education of our college has organised Interdivisional cricket, shuttle and basketball tournaments and Regional Auxilium Intercollegiate Tournaments successfully,

The Auxilium Research Cell conducted an orientation programme on 14 September 2018 for all the Research Scholars and PG students on Academic Writing and Research Ethics, facilitated by Dr. Sagayaraj, Associate Professor of Computer Science, Sacred Heart College, Tirupatur. An orientation on Library Resources was arranged for the PG students on online and print resources available at the American Library.

IQAC-The Internal Quality Assurance Cell which imparts quality culture in the college, observed a “No Drive Day” on 12 September 2018 and 30 January 2019, known as the Green Consumer Day, as a part of Swach Bharath initiative to control carbon footprints in the campus. The ASQC members periodically animate awareness on topics of social responsibility and relevance.

Ms. Anitha of III Chemistry, an AICUF member represented our college at the 3-day state level women’s commission conducted at Holy Cross College, Trichy.

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell arranged a Soft Skill Training Program for the final year UG students of the college. Mr. Rajesh Thomas, Professional soft skill trainer, C2C, Chennai trained the students to participate effectively using verbal and non- verbal skills. Group discussions were conducted. An orientation programme was conducted by Ms. Nishita Singhal C.S., Assistant Director, ICSI, Bangalore, on Corporate Secretaryship.

Kanali Women Cell works on the motto “Empower Women to Enlighten Humanity”. Periodic visits to Blind Home and service to students of Don Bosco Higher Secondary School are part of the extension activities practised by members of the team. Human Rights day was observed in the Hostel by the Kanali Women Cell Members. Commemorating the International Women’s Day, competitions were held by the members of the cell.

The Youth Red Cross Club: YRC members participated in the International Yoga Day observed by the Indian Red Cross Society, Vellore District Branch. International World Heart Day was celebrated on the theme of “My Heart, Your Heart”. 69th Geneva Convention Day focusing on world peace was also observed. A Dental Camp was conducted by YRC at Blind School, Vellore. YRC members underwent a training program in Disaster Management. Ms. Priyadharshni.V.R Asst. Prof of English (Shift II) has been recognized by Indian Red Cross society Tamil Nadu Branch as trainer for Disaster Management in Tamil Nadu. Auxilium College received District award for Best Contribution in Youth Red Cross for the year 2017-2018.

The VIDES group pledged in 30 members from the first years to join and follow the objectives of the group, 'Light life'. This year, the VIDES adopted Don Bosco Higher Secondary school as their service was needed to coach the weak students.

Rangers participated in a Five-day regional level camp on Disaster Management held at Head Quarters of Bharat Scouts and Guides, Chennai also executing "Swachh Bharat" mission in Marina Beach and Mahabalipuram. Smart Beam Projector

A similar effect can be produced using ETC Source Four PAR fixtures with a clear lens. A snoot/top hat can be added to control spill.

Pope's Message on Peace:

New Year is a day to be amazed by the Mother of God. God appears as a little child, held in the arms of a woman who feeds her Creator. The statue before our eyes depicts the Mother and Child so close as to appear as one. That is the mystery we celebrate today, which gives rise to boundless amazement: God has become one with humanity forever. God and man, always together, that is the good news of this New Year. God is no distant lord, dwelling in splendid isolation above the heavens, but love incarnate, born like us of a mother, in order to be a brother to each of us, to be close to us: the God of closeness. He rests on the lap of his mother, who is also our mother, and from there he pours out upon humanity a new tenderness. Thus we come to understand more fully God's love, which is both paternal and maternal, like that of a mother who never stops believing in her children and never abandons them. God-with-us, Emmanuel, loves

In his peace message titled Non-Violence: A style of politics for peace, the Holy Father says, when victims of violence are able to resist the temptation, they become the most credible promoters of non-violence, peace making. In the most local and ordinary situation and in the International order, may Non-Violence become the hallmark of our decision, our relationships and our actions and indeed of political life in all its forms. Sadly, we find ourselves engaged in a horrifying world war. The Holy Father powerfully declares, Violence is not the cure for our broken world.

It has nothing to do with the bane of war, the folly of terrorism or the illusory force of arms, rather making space for peace calls for humility and courage, tenacity and perseverance more than anything else. Pope Francis finishes his speech saying that peace is to preserve in the faith and to continue to express its message to reconciliation, to brotherhood, through charitable and humanitarian works that benefit society as whole.

Digital Jewelry

Digital Jewellery is the fashion jewelry with embedded intelligence. It can help you solve problems like forgotten passwords and security badges. It is a nascent catchphrase for wearable ID devices that contain personal information like passwords, identification, and account information. They have the potential to be all-in-one replacements for your driver's license, key chain, business cards, credit cards, health insurance card, corporate security badge, and loose cash. They can also solve a common dilemma of today's wired world - the forgotten password.

Cell phones will take a totally new form, appearing to have no form at all. Instead of one single device, cell phones will be broken up into their basic components and packaged as various pieces of digital jewelry. Each piece of jewelry will contain a fraction of the components found in a conventional mobile phone. Together, the digital-jewelry cell phone should work just like a conventional cell phone. The various components that are inside a cell phone such as Microphone, Receiver, Touch pad, Display, Circuit board, Antenna, and Battery . IBM has developed a prototype of a cell phone that consists of several pieces of digital jewelry that will work together wirelessly, possibly with Blue tooth wireless technology, to perform the functions of the above components. Cell phones may one day be comprised of digital accessories that work together through wireless connections.

Here are the pieces of computerized-jewelry phone and their functions:

- Earrings - Speakers embedded into these earrings will be the phone's receiver.
- Necklace - Users will talk into the necklace's embedded microphone.

Ring - Perhaps the most interesting piece of the phone, this "magic decoder ring" is equipped with light-emitting diodes (LEDs) that flash to indicate an incoming call. It can also be programmed to flash different colors to identify a particular caller or indicate the importance of a call.

• Bracelet - Equipped with a video graphics array (VGA) display, this wrist display could also be used as a caller identifier that flashes the name and phone number of the caller.

With a jewelry phone, the keypad and dialling function could be integrated into the bracelet, or else dumped altogether -- it's likely that voice-recognition software will be used to make calls, a capability that is already commonplace in many of today's cell phones. Simply say the name of the person you want to call and the phone will dial that person. IBM is also working on a miniature rechargeable battery to power these components.

E-Paper Technology

E-paper is a revolutionary material that can be used to make next generation I, electronic displays. It is portable reusable storage and display medium that look like paper but can be repeatedly written one thousands of times. These displays make the beginning of a new area for battery power information applications such as cell phones, pagers, watches and hand-held computers etc. Two companies are carrying our pioneering works in the field of development of electronic ink and both have developed ingenious methods to produce electronic ink. One is E-ink, a company based at Cambridge, in U.S.A. The other company is Xerox doing research work at the Xerox's Palo Alto Research Centre. Both technologies being developed commercially for electronically configurable paper like displays rely on microscopic beads that change color in response to the charges on nearby electrodes. Like traditional paper, E-paper must be lightweight, flexible, glare free and low cost. Research found that in just few years this technology could replace paper in many situations and leading us ink a truly paperless world.

Electronic ink is a pioneering invention that combines all the desired features of a modern electronic display and the sheer convenience and physical versatility of sheet of paper. E-paper or electronic paper is sometimes called radio paper or smart paper. Paper would be perfect except for one obvious thing: printed words can't change. The effort is to create a dynamic high-resolution electronic display that's thin and flexible enough to become the next generation of paper. The technology has been identified and developed is well under way. Within five years, it is envisioned electronic books that can display volumes of information as easily as flipping a page and permanent newspapers that update themselves daily via wireless broadcast. They deliver the readability of paper under virtually any condition, without backlighting. And

electronic ink displays are persistent without power, drawing current only when they change, which means batteries can be smaller and last longer.

What is Cyberbullying?

Cyberbullying is bullying that takes place over digital devices like cell phones, computers, and tablets. Cyberbullying can occur through SMS., Text, and apps, or online in social media, foruMs., or gaming where people can view, participate in, or share content. Cyberbullying includes sending, posting, or sharing negative, harmful, false, or mean content about someone else. It can include sharing personal or private information about someone else causing embarrassment or humiliation. Some cyberbullying crosses the line into unlawful or criminal behavior.

The most common places where cyberbullying occurs are:

- Social Media, such as Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, and Twitter
- SMS. (Short Message Service) also known as Text Message sent through devices
- Instant Message (via devices, email provider services, apps, and social media messaging features)
- Email

Special Concerns

With the prevalence of social media and digital foruMs., comments, photos, posts, and content shared by individuals can often be viewed by strangers as well as acquaintances. The content an individual shares online – both their personal content as well as any negative, mean, or hurtful

content – creates a kind of permanent public record of their views, activities, and behavior. This public record can be thought of as an online reputation, which may be accessible to schools, employers, colleges, clubs, and others who may be researching an individual now or in the future. Cyberbullying can harm the online reputations of everyone involved – not just the person being bullied, but those doing the bullying or participating in it. Cyberbullying has unique concerns in that it can be:

Persistent – Digital devices offer an ability to immediately and continuously communicate 24 hours a day, so it can be difficult for children experiencing cyberbullying to find relief.

Permanent – Most information communicated electronically is permanent and public, if not reported and removed. A negative online reputation, including for those who bully, can impact college admissions, employment, and other areas of life.

Hard to Notice – Because teachers and parents may not overhear or see cyberbullying taking place, it is harder to recognize.

Laws and Sanctions

Although all states have laws requiring schools to respond to bullying, many states do not include cyberbullying under these laws or specify the role schools should play in responding to bullying that takes place outside of school. Schools may take action either as required by law, or with local or school policies that allow them to discipline or take other action. Some states also have provisions to address bullying if it affects school performance. You can learn about the laws and policies in each state, including if they cover cyberbullying.

Frequency of Cyberbullying

The 2015 School Crime Supplement – PDF(National Center for Education Statistics and Bureau of Justice Statistics) indicates that, nationwide, about 21% of students ages 12-18 experienced bullying.

The 2017 Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) indicates that an estimated 14.9% of high school students were electronically bullied in the 12 months prior to the survey.

With tremendous evolution in the past decade, real time technology is offering instant solution to complex problems. analysing innumerable variables and providing accurate results in real time. Smart patches are considerably small, stick-on wearables which compact in nature. They provide can real time update on your health care such as your glucose level, blood pressure, heart rate, hydration levels, etc., Let us have a short glimpse of few such smart technologies available in the circulation.

Kenzen

Kenzen is the world's first wireless smart patch for anytime health and performance monitoring. They are designed to provide reports for individual or team sport athletes and their coaches, the small, flexible Kenzen sensor patch consists of the ECHO monitor (a clip-in sensor) and the H2 Smart Patch.

According to Kenzen, the patch sensors analyse critical biomarkers, like sodium and potassium – all from a single bead of sweat, and provide real time feedback on performance, motion and vitals. Further, the ECHO monitor collects data on your hydration levels, lactic acid build-up, and calorie measurement. The wearables provide the data in real time via the software application to your smartphone. You can have real time tracking of your health in glimpse with this tech at your hand.

Bio-Stamp Research Connect

Bio stamp Research Connect is stunning piece of technology specially designed for research oriented data analysis. This technology is termed as the “first research system designed for the human body” features the groundbreaking technology of the Bio-Stamp Sensor, which provides the simplest way to gather complex physiological data of a subject within short span. This brilliant system is even seamlessly integrated into the researcher workflow via easily accessible tablet and web app. Powered by a 15mAh rechargeable battery, the device provides 36

hours of run time and the capacity to be waterproof to 1m. Also the Bio-StampRC packs an accelerometer, a gyroscope, a mini ECG, and much more. This is wonderful wearable tech designed for researchers who are looking into problems with movement, motor skills and other neurodegenerative disorders.

Proteus Digital Health

Proteus Digital health, a smart pill which is evolved technology which is used to determine some of the lifestyle oriented health problems such as Diabetes which is on the increasing trend & threatening the future generations. This is completely safe, digestible smart pill that can collect the data after being ingested through signals paired with a smart patch.

Proteus Digital Health works by combining a smart patch with a digestible sensor-enabled smart pill. Pioneering a new field called Digital Medicine; the system's sensor-embedded pill sends signals to the patch once it has reached the stomach of the user. After this, the patch collects all of the pill's information (from inside the user) and transmits the data to the Proteus software app. The collected data can be analysed within a short duration of time to decide on the medication for diabetes.

Sweat Smart

Body sweat can provide a lot of information on the physiology of a patient with help of glucose, body salt and hydration levels. A team of researchers at the University of Pennsylvania had designed a graphene sensor-enabled wearable which can analyse these parameters from the patient's body sweat. Sweat-Smart, a wearable sweat sensor which uses a graphene sensor to monitor hydration during exercise. The Sweat-Smart links to a smartphone app to plot glucose and electrolyte levels in real time which in turn can be used in analysing the condition of the subject.

X2 Biosystems.

Casualties caused by sports are severe as the impact and the nature is unpredictable. X2 Biosystem is a little patch or stick-on that is meant to be placed behind an athlete's ear.

The chief goal of the X2 is to recognise the force and direction of an impact to the cranial region of an athlete, thus, decreasing head injuries. The patch also boasts full 6 DOF for linear and rotational impacts, an X2 VPS system for accuracy, and vectoring of impact location and direction. This device can be very useful in determining the extent of damage by analysing the impact of force & the locality of the impact based on which immediate medication can be offered to the affected individual. This technology can help in solving several trauma and injuries reported during any sports with considerably shorter duration of time.
